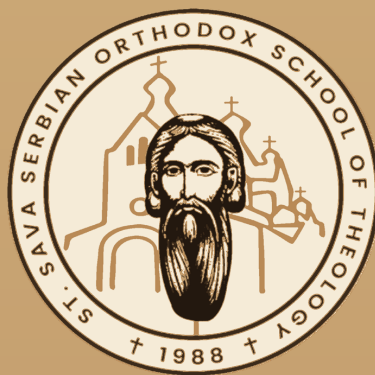

V. Rev. Dr. Aleksandar Novakovic was born in 1975 in the town of Rudo, Republika Srpska, Bosnia and Herzegovina. After finishing elementary school, Aleksandar was accepted to St. Sava Seminary in Belgrade, where he graduated in 1995. In 1996, with the blessing of His Holiness Patriarch Pavle, he began his undergraduate studies at the St. Sava School of Theology in Libertyville, Illinois. Upon graduation from St. Sava, Aleksandar enrolled in master's theological studies at St. Vladimir's Seminary in Scarsdale, New York, where he graduated in 2002.

Fr. Aleksandar returned to St. Sava Monastery, Libertyville, upon graduation and began working as librarian of the St. Sava School of Theology. His Eminence Metropolitan Christopher ordained him to the rank of Deacon in October 2003 at St. Basil Church in Lake Forest, Illinois, where he served until his ordination to the rank of Presbyter on the feast of St. Alexander Nevsky in September 2004. After ordination, Fr. Aleksandar served at St. Sava Monastery and occasionally at other Chicago-area parishes. In the meantime, his responsibilities at St. Sava Seminary grew: Dean of Students in 2003, school secretary in 2004, and instructor of the Church Mission course in 2006.

With the blessing of His Eminence Metropolitan Christopher, Fr. Aleksandar continued his education at the University of St. Mary of the Lake in Mundelein, completing coursework toward a Doctorate in Pastoral Theology. He completed two years of Doctor of Ministry classes and defended his doctoral thesis, *"Pastoral Ministry to the Sick in the Life and Praxis of the Serbian Orthodox Church,"* under the supervision of Fr. Raymond Wedd, Ph.D., and Fr. Thomas Baima, S.T.D., with advisors Fr. Robert Barron, S.T.D., Fr. Michael Fuller, S.T.D., and Dr. Colt Anderson, on May 1, 2012. The thesis was submitted to the Graduate School of Theology of the University of St. Mary of the Lake / Mundelein Seminary and accepted in fulfillment of the requirements for the degree of Doctor of Ministry.

The Holy Synod of the Serbian Orthodox Church, at its regular session in Belgrade, Serbia, on July 4, 2023, appointed Fr. Aleksandar Novakovic as Dean of the Saint Sava Serbian Orthodox School of Theology.

Saint Sava Serbian Orthodox Monastery



The beautiful St. Sava Monastery was founded by St. Bishop Mardarije in 1925 in Libertyville, Illinois. It was built in the ancient Orthodox tradition, with domes adorning the top of the church visible from far away. Inside are priceless icons and majestic stained-glass windows. St. Sava Monastery is listed among the Historical Places in the State of Illinois.

St. Sava Monastery has served as the seat of the first Bishop and the first Serbian Orthodox Diocese of the U.S.A. and Canada.

Mission Statement

The St. Sava School of Theology has as its main mission and goal to provide religious education and to train candidates — from the United States, Canada, and other countries — for the Holy Priesthood of the Serbian Orthodox Church, and for interested individuals of other ethnic jurisdictions of the Orthodox Christian Faith. The School functions as an educational center for individuals committed to serving the Serbian Orthodox Church and her people in a multi-lingual environment. It provides quality baccalaureate-level study in Theology leading to the Bachelor of Divinity Degree, as approved and uniquely required for the Serbian Orthodox Church, for both resident full-time students and part-time students.

Our mission is to serve the Serbian Orthodox Church by providing the highest level of education to our students. To serve the needs of the Church more fully, we also recognize the need to provide, in addition to academic education, human, spiritual, and pastoral formation. We accomplish our mission by integrating these four elements, thus successfully preparing students for service to the Church and its needs: clergy, missionaries, iconographers, choir directors, educators, and laity.

Short-Term Objectives of the Institution

The initial strategy in establishing this institution was to form relationships with existing Schools of Theology. St. Sava School of Theology applied for and received a Charter from the Holy Assembly of Bishops and the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Serbian Orthodox Church, and has met the requirements for Operating Authority in Illinois. On that basis, the School has also received authority to grant the Bachelor of Divinity Degree. The institution is by nature a small one, with a specialized program for students interested in the priesthood and/or preparation for advanced studies in Orthodox Christian Theology. Facilities have been secured for housing and boarding of students, classroom space, and the beginnings of a specialized library. Cooperative programs with other theological schools, library usage, and exchange of instructors have been planned. The School operates its program in accordance with the American model, in order to comply with State Board of Higher Education requirements.

Funding is provided by an annual budget proposed by the School and adopted and implemented by the Board of Trustees and the Holy Synod of the Serbian Orthodox Church. As the needs of the School grow, the budget is adjusted accordingly. Financial support is sought from all Dioceses and Church congregations comprising the Church.

Academic Control

Board of Trustees (Directors). The governing board of the institution, known as the Board of Trustees, is comprised of seven (7) Trustees (Directors). The Board maintains an Executive Committee to conduct School business between Board meetings, as the Trustees authorize, and a Finance Committee to exercise general supervision over the School's finances for its support and maintenance. The Board of Trustees oversees the proper functioning of the School plant, faculty, student body, and finances, as provided for by the laws and ordinances of the School and as required by relevant Church, academic, and civil authorities.

The design and conduct of the degree program follow requirements prescribed by the Holy Synod of the Serbian Orthodox Church and approved by the Holy Assembly of Bishops for general theological curriculum standards.

Faculty Council

The Faculty Council is responsible for implementing the approved degree requirements set by the Higher Education authorities of the State of Illinois. The School will seek membership in the Association of Theological Schools to help ensure the continued quality of its program. Student evaluations are conducted in the Spring of the Sophomore and Junior years and in the Fall of the Senior year, to help students discern their own vocational path with the aid of a career-assessment process. This is supplemented by the faculty's evaluation and recommendation regarding a student's candidacy for ordination. An internship diagnosis, carried out in the context of the Teaching Parish Team, helps students recognize the ministerial areas in which they most need to grow, and a post-internship review involves the faculty's evaluation of the student's overall fitness for ministry.

Facilities, Equipment and Library

The Dormitory, classrooms, and refectory of the School of Theology are housed in the St. Sava and New Gračanica Monastery Camp Building during the school year. Other facilities are located in various places on the monastery grounds. Facilities consist of the following:

- A large red building with a common dining hall, kitchen, recreation room, classrooms, dormitory rooms for student housing, a student lounge, and an office.
- A church for worship.
- A frame library building with three areas for bookshelves, a catalog room with a computer, and a one-room office.

Dormitory & Church Life

All full-time students reside in the school dormitory and are expected to abide by the rules governing all aspects of student life. While at St. Sava, students are responsible for the proper maintenance of cleanliness in the dorm, the church, and the sanctuary, for dining-room assistance, and for other duties as assigned. Responsibilities are assigned by the Dean of Students, who oversees student life and activities on campus. He is responsible for the weekly schedule of cantors, as well as students' regular attendance at all worship services. He also coordinates dining-room assistance schedules and inspects student rooms and other facilities used by students.

Professors and students are actively involved in the church life of the Serbian Orthodox Church, especially in the Midwestern Diocese. Matins and Vespers are served daily at St. Sava and New Gracanica Monastery, along with Vigils and Divine Liturgies according to the Church calendar. Students preach at services throughout the Midwestern Diocese and give concerts of sacred music. During the summer, and when possible, the student chorus travels to other Dioceses on concert tours on behalf of the School. The student chorus has released its first CD of sacred music for distribution among the parishes, for the benefit of the School.

School Finances

The School's fiscal year runs from January 1 to December 31, coinciding with the National Church's fiscal year for budget purposes. The School receives no government or private grants. Church congregations and other local church organizations contribute annually to the Theological School Foundation Fund, which supplements the School's budget in accordance with the adopted budget. Other sources of income include private, voluntary donations and contributions to the Student Aid Fund for scholarships.

Financial Aid

Financial aid is available only to students preparing for ordination to the priesthood. Stipends are considered loans by the School, pending ordination and Church service after graduation. Applicants in need of school loans should submit applications, if qualified, to the School's Financial Aid Office no later than July 10.

Only transfer credits compatible with this School's program are counted toward graduation. An Incomplete grade may remain on a student's record for one semester only, following the semester in which it was received; failure to remove the Incomplete by the end of the probationary semester results in an automatic grade of F. Only one make-up exam is permitted in any failed course, within two weeks of the end of the semester. Failure of the make-up exam requires that the course be repeated and passed with no further make-up exam; repeated failure will result in dismissal from the School.

A student who demonstrates poor performance during the first semester will be placed on probation for the following semester, or else required to withdraw from further study. Continued enrollment for a student on probation depends on overall performance for the full school year. Persons wishing to audit courses must be properly registered.

Further student evaluations are conducted during the Spring semester of the second and third years, and in the Fall of the fourth year, to help students determine their own vocational decisions with the aid of a career-assessment program. These evaluations are supplemented by the faculty's recommendations regarding a student's candidacy for ordination. Parish Practicum is evaluated in the context of the Parish Teaching Team; a post-internship review involves the faculty's final evaluation of the student's overall fitness for ministry.

Official transcripts are issued only directly to other academic institutions. Requests may be made in writing or in person; telephone requests are not accepted. Students may request an unofficial transcript from the Registrar's Office for a fee of \$50.00.

Admission Requirements

Admission requirements for the School of Theology include graduation from High School, Junior College, College, or a Middle Orthodox Seminary with grades of A and B, or a grade point average of 3.0, and passing of an entrance examination.

Bachelor of Divinity Degree Requirements

- The number of credits accepted in transfer from other institutions is determined by the nature of the sending institution and whether the courses submitted are equivalent to courses offered at this School. Transferring students must complete the prescribed curriculum of this School; full credit is awarded for equivalent language courses.
- Life-experience credit is determined by evaluation of relevant Church service — such as liturgical chant with rubrics, administration — and demonstrated proficiency in the languages offered by this School.
- Proficiency-examination credit is accepted only for liturgical chant, rubrics, and languages offered by this School; the corresponding course is waived if the candidate demonstrates proficiency of a grade of B or higher.
- The grade point average required for advancement and graduation is 2.50.
- The residency requirement for all full-time students is four years. Transfer students and special students requiring evaluation must satisfy a minimum of one year's residency, or more as required, to complete all graduation requirements.
- The time limit for completion of the program is four years.
- A certificate from the School Librarian confirming that all library books have been returned must be submitted.
- Every student is graded annually for attendance and participation at daily and festal worship services; the grade is recorded on the transcript under Practicum. Failure is taken into account in determining whether the student may continue studies. Only one make-up exam is permitted, within two weeks of finals; the course must otherwise be repeated and passed, with no make-up exam, for graduation.

- A short autobiography, including a statement of how education from St. Sava Serbian School of Theology will be used in service to the Church.
- References — names and addresses of two people you plan to use as references. It is your responsibility to personally contact those individuals and request the recommendations.
- A photograph of yourself.
- A letter of endorsement (blessing) from your Diocesan Bishop.
- A non-refundable fee of \$15.00 must accompany the application.

Applicants in need of financial aid should inquire with their respective Diocesan authorities as to what student loans, or co-signing of student loans, are available, and the terms and conditions governing such loans.

Graduates who have not yet committed to marriage or monastic tonsure usually begin active ministry even before ordination, either in the U.S., in Canada, or in their home Diocese abroad. Some pursue postgraduate studies and actively serve in the Religious Education ministry of the Church, earning advanced degrees. Over one hundred graduates have been ordained to the priesthood.

Forty Years of St. Sava School of Theology

1986–2026

St. Sava School of Theology in Libertyville, Illinois, is a significant institution of the Serbian Orthodox Church in North America — since its founding in 1986, the only institution of higher theological education for Serbs and the Serbian Orthodox Church in the Western Hemisphere. Nearly two hundred students have graduated from the School, most of whom now serve the Church and Orthodox communities throughout the world.

Historical Roots

Although formally established in 1986, the School's origins reach back centuries, beginning with the Theological College founded in Petrovaradin in 1741. The vision for a Serbian theological school in America was born in the 1930s with Bishop Mardarije (Uskokovic), though economic hardship and global upheaval delayed its realization. A short-lived theological school did operate at St. Sava Monastery beginning in 1945, with Bishop Nikolaj (Velimirovic) among its teachers and Bishop Dionisije (Milivojevic) providing oversight — laying the spiritual and educational foundation for the School that exists today.

Founding and Growth

Growing calls from Church leadership and Serbian-American communities through the 1970s and '80s pointed to the need for a permanent institution of theological education in North America. That call was answered in 1986, when a branch of the Faculty of Orthodox Theology of the Serbian Orthodox Church (Belgrade) opened at St. Sava Monastery under the leadership of Bishop Sava (Vukovic) and later Metropolitan Christopher (Kovacevic). From 1988 to 1996, the School was affiliated with the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, connecting Serbian faculty and students to broader American theological networks; in 1988 the branch became an independent School of Theology, recognized by both the Serbian Orthodox Church and the Illinois Board of Higher Education.

Over the following four decades, graduates have gone on to serve as parish priests and deacons, diocesan officials, religious educators, and missionaries throughout North America, Europe, and the Serbian homeland — some returning to the School as faculty, sustaining a living connection between past and present.

A Unifying Mission

Though originally founded for American-born Serbian students, the School has, over time, drawn most of its candidates from the Serbian homeland — a development that has helped preserve the Serbian language, traditional church chant, and liturgical practice within diaspora parishes. Beyond its academic role, the School has played a significant part in preserving the unity of the Serbian Orthodox Church in America, particularly following the 1963 church schism; its graduates now serve across what were once divided ecclesiastical structures, contributing to reconciliation through shared pastoral ministry.

Recent Developments

Due to the deteriorating condition of the campus building at St. Sava Monastery, the School relocated temporarily in 2015 to New Gracanica Monastery in Third Lake, Illinois. The School has continued its mission with the support of dedicated clergy, faculty, and the faithful — notably through the fund established by the late benefactor Dragomir Nikolic, scholarships from the Vlastimir and Draginja Jovic Fund, and contributions from many devoted Serbian-Americans that help keep tuition accessible.

The School has also seen important institutional growth with the establishment of a School Council, chaired by His Eminence Archbishop and Metropolitan Longin (Krco), and has recently come under the direct jurisdiction of the Holy Assembly of Bishops of the Serbian Orthodox Church. With the personal support of His Holiness Serbian Patriarch Porfirije, the School continues to pursue full academic accreditation with the Middle States Commission on Higher Education,

having already received initial candidacy status, with full accreditation anticipated by summer 2027.

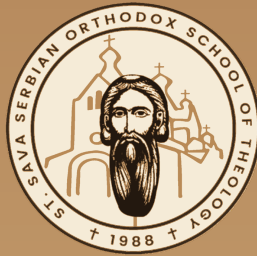
